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On the HCISD Board of **Cover** Trustees Seeks to Fill

Two Seats This May

This Election Day on May 3, voters in the Harlingen Consolidated **Independent School** District (HCISD) will decide who fills two crucial seats on the Board of Trustees: Place 3 and Place 7. Early voters can choose their candidates between April 22 and April 29 (find polling locations and times at https:// www.cameroncountytx. gov/elections/.

With the district facing a financial crisis, the stakes are higher than ever. Explore Harlingen Magazine asked each candidate two key questions:

- 1. How will you engage parents, teachers, and the community to ensure transparency, responsiveness, and effective decisionmaking as a school board member?
- 2. As education continues to evolve, how will you help ensure HCISD remains competitive in teacher retention,

curriculum, and technology while addressing the diverse needs of staff and students?

Below, the candidates listed in the order their names will appear on the ballot and by place, share their visions for transparency, teacher retention, curriculum innovation. and community engagement.

Place 3 Candidates

Diana Cortez Young, Place 3 Candidate (#1 on the ballot)

Background: A proud retired educator with 42 years in public education, Diana Cortez Young has spent her entire career at HCISD. She has served as a math teacher, counselor, head counselor, curriculum specialist, administrator, and university faculty member for student teachers.

Transparency & Community Engagement

Being fully retired, I have the time and flexibility to visit schools, ensuring parents, teachers, and the community are actively engaged. I would ask teachers and parents, "What can I do for you?"

Teachers are experts in their field, and it is crucial to listen to them, check in with them, and support their needs. I firmly believe in truth, no matter how difficult it may be. Transparency is essential in earning trust, and it must be practiced consistently and in a timely manner. In any crisis, we must respond clearly, quickly,

and efficiently.

Effective decisionmaking requires input from all stakeholders teachers, parents, and the community. By actively listening to concerns, we can make informed decisions that benefit everyone. It takes all of us working together.

Teacher Retention & Curriculum **Innovation**

Retaining teachers requires a fresh approach. Professional development exists, but does it truly align with teachers' needs and goals? Are teachers given ownership of their growth? Have we fostered a culture that genuinely supports educators?

A strong school environment fosters belonging, unity, and morale, making it a rewarding workplace beyond test scores. Regular feedback through surveys or oneon-one conversations is essential. If teachers leave HCISD, Human Resources should conduct exit interviews to understand why.

Mentorship for first-year teachers is crucial. Supporting new and veteran educators with stress management strategies and professional growth opportunities can help prevent burnout and keep teaching enjoyable.

Curriculum must evolve with community needs. As technology advances, we can't predict every future job, but we must stay ahead by partnering with higher education institutions. We must ensure every student has the skills to thrive in a competitive, fastchanging world.

We must be adaptable, supporting every staff member and student in meaningful ways. Doing things the same way is no longer enough. As a board member, I would always ask, "Are we striving to be better tomorrow than today?"

Laura Longoria (#2 on the ballot for Place 3)

Transparency & Community Engagement

Keeping an open line of communication with stakeholders is the key to success. I would ask that HCISD create a survey where parents, staff, and the community can submit concerns and feedback. As a board member, I feel that it is important that everyone has a voice and is heard.

Teacher Retention & Curriculum Innovation

Of utmost importance is to get HCISD financially stable. HCISD cannot be competitive if it is operating under a deficit budget. Educators must be provided with the tools and resources to be successful in the classroom. Meeting HCISD staff's needs is the key to remaining competitive. The teachers are the subject matter experts in the classroom, and I would rely on their expertise to make informed decisions to move HCISD forward.

Rebekah "Bekah" Batot (#3 on the ballot for Place 3)

Transparency & Community Engagement

As a parent, I regularly interact with teachers and other parents, observing firsthand the district's strengths and areas for improvement. School board members must be receptive to community feedback to make informed decisions. I will continue to personally seek input from stakeholders, just as I have throughout my campaign.

I advocate for expanding communication between parents and the district. This means meeting people where they are—on social media, the district website, and in

community centers—to share information and gather input. Hosting community forums in neighborhood settings would encourage open discussions in a less formal environment.

Parental involvement policies should be reviewed and revised. Studies show that engaged parents lead to more successful students, yet recent trends have made parental participation more restrictive. I believe we can maintain safety while increasing parental involvement.

Teacher Retention & Curriculum Innovation

For HCISD to remain competitive, we must continuously assess programs from rollout through implementation.
Regular checkpoints ensure our resources—whether time, talent, or funding—are used efficiently to support quality education.

Supporting teachers is essential. They need materials, time for lesson planning, meaningful professional development, and competitive pay and benefits. We must celebrate and support them in tangible ways.

By implementing these strategies, I aim to foster a culture of transparency, responsiveness, and collaboration. Together, we can make decisions that reflect the needs of our students, support our teachers, and serve the interests of our entire community.

Teacher Retention & Curriculum Innovation

As a school board member, I am committed to ensuring that the district's budget is allocated in a way that prioritizes the needs of both educators and students. I will work to guarantee that teachers are given retention bonuses and have access to the resources they need without having to cover the costs out of pocket. This includes providing a sufficient budget for classroom supplies, as well as ensuring affordable employee and family benefits for all district staff. Additionally, I will advocate for a contract with a local health clinic to offer special rates for HCISD employees, promoting the health and wellbeing of our dedicated staff. Understanding the important role of support staff, I will push for adequate paraprofessional assistance for teachers, including bus drivers, ensuring they have the support needed to maintain safety in the classrooms and on school routes.

For our students, I will focus on expanding post-secondary opportunities, offering

diverse pathways to success. One of my goals is to help students graduate with skills, certifications, or licensures, needed to enter the workforce directly, such as a Registered Nurse. I will also work to strengthen partnerships with local colleges and universities, providing affordable options for higher education. Finally, I will champion educational programs such as VIDA, which assist students with financial support for college. By offering these resources, we can alleviate the financial

The Moon Rock: Flavors Harlingen's Ultimate

If you're a foodie looking for a one-of-akind dining experience in Harlingen, The Moon Rock is the place to be. This lively food truck park and bar, inspired by the energy of Rainey Street in downtown Austin, offers a mix of flavors, fun, and

entertainment unlike anything else in the Rio Grande Valley (RGV).

A Local's Dream **Turned Reality**

The vision behind The Moon Rock comes from Christian Zanca, a proud Harlingen native with deep roots in the RGV—his family is so intertwined with the

community that the San Benito stadium was named after his grandfather, Bobby Morrow.

After attending a sports academy in New Braunfels for tennis and baseball and earning his BA from Colorado Mesa University in Grand Junction, CO, Christian returned to Harlingen following his grandfather's passing. He dove into real estate and successfully transformed the Broken Sprocket in Brownsville into a hotspot for food trucks and live entertainment.

With his family's support, he decided

to bring that same dynamic concept to Harlingen. The Moon Rock was born—a passion project fueled by a \$150K investment and an old Schwan's building converted into a full-service bar. entertainment hub, and community gathering space. Today, it features a stage, basketball, and volleyball courts, a dog park, shaded seating, and plenty of lighting for evening fun.

An Incubator for Flavor and Fun

The Moon Rock isn't just a food truck park; it's an incubator for food and entertainment,

This month's recipe is perfect for an upcoming healthy Easter dish! Let's make Keto taco-layered salad.

Ingredients:

- 1 pound ground turkey
- 4 ripe avocados
- 1 large tomato
- 1 bushel of fresh cilantro
- 1 bag of any flavor pork rinds
- 1 small bag of shredded cheddar cheese
- ½ large red onion
- 1 cup sour cream
- 2 limes
- Salt and pepper
- Garlic powder
- A large glass trifle bowl

Instructions:

1. In a medium- to highheat large skillet, cook the ground turkey for 25 minutes, adding salt, pepper, and garlic **Keto Taco-Layered**

- 2. Slice up and mash your avocados.
- 3. Add a pinch of salt and the juice from the fresh limes to the avocados.
- 4. Dice up your tomatoes and red onions.
- 5. Chop the cilantro a rough chop.
- 6. When the ground turkey is done cooking, assemble and layer the salad in your large glass trifle bowl. Add a handful of pork rinds, a layer of the ground turkey, a layer of shredded cheddar cheese, a layer of onions, tomatoes, and onions, and finish with sour cream.
- 7. Continue layering until you are satisfied with the height in the glass trifle bowl.
- 8. At the very top, add a heaping of guacamole

- along with onion, tomatoes, and cilantro for a fun bright topping.
- 9. Let the salad set for 10 minutes in the fridge. Use salad tongs to serve.

Not only is this dish delicious and healthy, but it's also perfect for these upcoming spring and summer months. Enjoy!

Knights of Columbus Spotlight to Host Annual Good Friday Fish Fry Fundraiser

The Knights of Columbus annual Good Friday Fish Fry event is right around the corner. The fundraiser is set for April 18, 2025 from 11 am to 2 pm.

Edgar Martinez, Grand Knight with the Knights of Columbus Council 2785, encourages the public to come out and support this event that has been going on since the 1990s or earlier according to Martinez.

"Please help us help the community because without you, we won't make a difference,"

Martinez said.

Martinez, who has been a Knight for a little over six years, is passionate about helping others.

"One of the main pillars (of the Knights of Columbus) is charity," he said. "Our main goal is to help... our mission is to help out those who need help no matter who they are. Charity is a duty; it's not a courtesy."

The Harlingen **Knights of Columbus** Council 2785 was established on November 14, 1937 though the Knights of Columbus as an organization was

Connecticut. Ever since then, men that are part of the organization actively serve communities through different initiatives and programs.

"We are one of the older councils in not only the Rio Grande Valley (RGV) and the state, but in the whole nation," he said.

The Knights of Columbus Council 2785 has members from all over the RGV, San Antonio, Houston, and even California and are 234 members strong.

Events such as the Good Friday Fish Fry benefit organizations that the Knights of Columbus supports such as Sunny Glen Children's Home in
San Benito, Family
Crisis Center in
Harlingen, and La
Posada Providencia,
an emergency shelter
in San Benito, among
others. They also
provide scholarships for
local students and help
with school supplies at
the beginning of each
school year and many

other initiatives.

Martinez said the proceeds of this fish fry will specifically be going to Habitat for Humanity and the Special Olympics.

"The plates will be loaded," Martinez said of the fish-fry.
"It's going to have the best-tasting fish in the RGV... with a side of savory rice and some very delicious coleslaw, and no one shall be disappointed."

"At the end of the day, what keeps us going, is knowing we did good," Martinez said.

Granting Wishes, **Nonprofits** Changing Lives: The Impact of Make-A-Wish RGV

Every child deserves a moment of pure joy—a chance to dream beyond the walls of a hospital room, to experience something magical. For children battling critical illnesses in the Rio Grande Valley (RGV), Make-A-Wish RGV is a fairy godmother, turning dreams into reality.

Under the current leadership of CEO Rebecca Ramirez Gearhart, Make-A-Wish RGV continues to inspire the lives of children and families facing critical illnesses throughout

our Valley home. In 1998, the Make-A-Wish RGV branch became independent from its place as part of the Houston chapter to focus solely on children from Cameron, Hidalgo, Willacy,

Brooks, Kenedy, and Starr counties. Since then, the organization has granted nearly 1,800 wishes, bringing joy and hope to families during some of their most challenging times.

"I truly believe that the hope and the love and the joy that wishes bring to families is something so special," Gearhart notes.

Make-A-Wish grants wishes to children between the ages of $2\frac{1}{2}$ and 18 who are diagnosed with critical illnesses. Many believe that wishes are only for terminally ill children,

but that's a common misconception, according to Gearhart. Many wish recipients go on to recover and lead fulfilling lives. Gearhart has witnessed firsthand that the experience of receiving a wish can be transformative, providing emotional strength and resilience as kids and their families undergo medical treatments.

The journey of granting a wish starts with a referral, which can come from a medical professional, family member, or

even the child. Once eligibility is confirmed, the Make-A-Wish team meets with the child to uncover his or her biggest dream. Wishes generally fall into five categories: "Wish to Go" (travel experiences like

visiting Disney World or South Padre Island), "Wish to Have" (special gifts such as gaming systems or bedroom makeovers), "Wish to Be" (becoming a superhero, a firefighter, or another dream role for a day), "Wish to Meet" (meeting a celebrity, athlete, or public figure), or "Wish to Give" (children using their wish to help others).

After approval, the planning process begins, ensuring that every detail is perfect. While the ideal timeline is three to six months, urgent wishes can be granted in as little as two weeks when necessary.

Much like any nonprofit organization, one of the biggest challenges Make-A-Wish RGV faces is funding. The organization relies on donations, grants, and fundraising events to keep wishes alive.

"Every wish costs \$6,500-\$7,500 on average," Gearhart shares. "And with prices going up, we rely heavily on the community to help us fund our wishes."

Fortunately, the RGV community has always stepped up. Local businesses, schools, and volunteers come together to provide support, whether through hosting fundraising events or ensuring wish days are extra special.

Some wishes stand out not just for their grandeur, but for their emotional impact. One particularly moving story is that of a young girl who battled severe epilepsy and had undergone multiple brain surgeries. "[Her mother] said 'you know we [...] could've bought a puppy at any time," Gearhart shares. "But they were so focused on the doctor's appointments. They were so focused on their child's medical needs [...] that was the last thing that they were thinking [about]. It gave the family some sort of relief and rest, because we were taking care of all the extra stuff and giving them a little bit of hope that they didn't have."

For other families, these wishes offer a rare chance to escape the daily struggles of illness and simply enjoy time together.

Make-A-Wish RGV offers multiple ways for the community to get involved. While every dollar donated makes a difference in granting a child's wish, volunteering and sharing a social media post are both greatly impactful.

For families currently facing a critical illness, Gearhart shares this message: "You are not alone. While doctors provide medicine, we provide hope. We are here for you every step of the way."

Artist of Plush Panaderia: the Month A Latina-Owned

Business Celebrating and Preserving Mexican American

When Andrea Luna's beloved grandmother passed away in 2019 her family created an ofrenda (offering) to honor her memory.

As a child, she remembers going to the bakery with her grandmother to pick her favorite pan dulce. Her grandmother loved sweet bread. This tradition

inspired her to create the first plush prototypes for the offering that would allow them to add to her grandmother's collection. As her son grew to be a toddler, he started to play with the plush bread.

"I wanted my son, all our children, to grow up with a deep connection and pride in their culture. Our children see us celebrate life, and food is a central part of most

celebrations," Luna said.

The Latina-owned business is dedicated to preserving Mexican American heritage while promoting cultural pride. Plush Panaderia officially launched in October 2023 at a Dia De Los Muertos festival at the International Museum of Art and Science in McAllen. Since then, Luna says they've traveled the state doing pop-ups and events where she sells her art.

Plush Panaderia has

gone from three products (concha, marranito, and empanada plushies) in their first event to more than 60 products now including pillows and jewelry that celebrate values, families, food, and Mexican culture. They also sell fresh bread baked by her husband, Rogelio Luna.

"He bakes for almost every single event we do," she said. "Rarely there will be some events that don't allow food, only art. He makes all kinds of pan dulce: empanadas, marranitos, cakes, cinnamon rolls, and conchas."

His specialty conchas range from filled conchas to mini sized ones or

decorative conchas such as a Hello Kitty concha that he makes. Their unique flavors are also part of the appeal with mango, matcha, and blueberry flavored conchas.

Both Rogelio and Andrea dedicate themselves full-time to their business. They have experienced many challenges throughout their journey thus far, but Andrea says that fighting for legitimacy as an artist is one.

"As an artist I have had to fight for legitimacy, for my art to be seen as more than 'arts and crafts'. This

has been the fight for many Latina artists," she said. "I have been blessed enough to have my art up and currently selling at the International Museum of Art and Science now, but it did not start out that way. People may not always understand your art that you put your heart into, but that just means it wasn't for them."

There are positive things that come from running a business like Plush Panaderia and Andrea mentions one of them is making connections.

"The best part is connecting with the community. Many older (and younger) Latina women have deeply connected with my art, embraced and thanked me for representing our culture with pride. This is my love letter to our people, especially in such difficult times. I feel so privileged to be able to continue to celebrate our


cultural traditions," she said.

What does the future hold for Plush Panaderia? Andrea mentions that one of the short-term plans is to launch a website soon to make ordering easier. A long-term plan is to have a brick-and-mortar locale for their business.

"Long-term I want to create a beautiful panaderia, not just a beautiful building but one filled with delicious pan dulce and my handmade art. I want it to be a cultural experience that celebrates the beauty of our people," she said.

"I have blended my love for delicious pan dulce and fine art to bring a nostalgic experience to those who stop by," Andrea said of those that visit them at their events.






Nathan is competing

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


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
